Sinn Fein — totally unfitted for government in Northern Ireland!

It is not just photographs of the IRA destroying its arms that should be demanded — it is the destruction of that evil organisation called Sinn Fein that is required as evidence of a true and lasting repudiation of violence and terror by Irish Republicanism.

Sinn Fein, as a political entity, is but the embodiment of that spirit of lawlessness which has resided in such areas as south Armagh, sections of west Tyrone, Londonderry's Bogside and other areas along the borderlands. Sinn Fein glories in its lawlessness. It is a mere sport to it to defy the authority of the State in every way it can. Every regulation that lawful government ever instituted, it takes delight in defying. That was seen during the last "foot and mouth" outbreak. When it was obvious that the danger to livestock was very great and a full compliance with the rules, designed to stop the spread of the disease, was but in the common interest of all, Sinn Fein/IRA, unable to resist its inherent hatred of law and order, defied the restrictions and helped spread the disease by its lawlessness, in order to profit illegally from compensation paid to those with animals infected.

Recently, there was a horrific murder in Co. Tyrone. Mr. Patrick McGrath (75) from near Coalisland was found dead in his home, the victim of a homicidal burglar, it is believed. Sinn Feiner, Martin McGuinness is the local MP. He was asked by reporters if he would advise his constituents to offer any information they had on the matter to the police. It should be borne in mind that he was the Minister of Education during the Trimble Coalition. and its days of terror are behind it, could not even bring himself to tell his constituents to assist the police in their inquiries into the cold-blooded murder of an aged Roman Catholic pensioner! That is how deep the anti-establishmentarianism runs in the veins of an Irish republican.

But the most widely reported evidence of the treachery of Sinn Fein was the recent bank robbery in Belfast when £22 million was stolen by an IRA gang. During the raid, the robbers took over two houses and held families hostage as two Northern Bank employees were ordered to help in the operation to clear the vaults. Police believe the stolen money was taken to a yard in West Belfast's Grosvenor Road area, transferred to another vehicle and driven away for storage, possibly in an underground bunker.

In case it is said that they have not caught the robbers and therefore the guilty are, as yet, unknown, let me set forth the evidence that points the finger firmly in the direction of Sinn Fein/IRA.

Police

The Police Service of Northern Ireland has said from the very beginning of the investigations into the robbery, that it bears all the hallmarks of republican gangsters. The police force of the Irish Republic also believed that it was the IRA. Irish Government negotiators are reported as planning to raise the bank robbery with Sinn Fein early in the New Year.

Garda Special Branch sources disputed the IRA's denial of involvement in the Belfast robbery. Sinn Fein has said it "accepts what the IRA is saying, that it was not involved". However, Special Branch officers insisted that the raid was carried out by republicans, who are current or recently-retired members of the IRA. Furthermore, the sources alleged that there was a South Armagh connection.

A former senior IRA commander, Sean O' Callaghan, was widely reported as saying that he had no doubt whatsoever that the IRA lay behind the robbery.

One reporter, who is held in esteem for his insight into Irish Republicanism, Liam Clarke, has written an article headlined: "Bank raid was work of the IRA." He wrote: "Police in Northern Ireland have concluded that the IRA was almost certainly responsible for last week's £22m robbery of the Northern Bank in Belfast. This weekend (25/12/04) police investigating the crime — the biggest bank robbery in British and Irish history — raided the homes of two suspected senior IRA men. . . . One official source said this weekend the available evidence 'would seem to point to the IRA. It was well executed and there are a limited amount of people with that sort of expertise who are capable of evading the security services. It is not ideal for the peace process but it is too early to say what the effect will be.' A series of police raids this weekend was concentrated on republican areas of north and west Belfast. Among the homes searched was a flat used by John Trainor, believed to be the intelligence officer of the IRA's Belfast brigade; and the home of Eddie Copeland, who has been described in court as a senior IRA figure in north Belfast. Trainor, who was not in when police called at about 9.30 am on Friday, has a previous conviction for explosives offences and was released early from prison under the Good Friday agreement. Outside his house, a small crowd heckled officers. . . . One said: 'Scum like you should get a kicking for harassing people at Christmas.'"

During later raids in the Ballymurphy estate, west Belfast, a hostile crowd of about 100 people attacked police. Five officers were injured and two - one of whom was unconscious - were taken to hospital.

If the IRA carried out the robbery, it would have been sanctioned by the organisation's adjutant-general, a Belfast resident who is a long-standing associate of Gerry Adams, the Sinn Fein president. It is suspected plans were drawn up by a different member of the IRA's general headquarters staff, the body responsible for its day-to-day running. This man currently holds the post of intelligence officer. He is a key supporter of Adams and has been used in the past to intimidate dissidents. Last month, the IRA was asked by the British and Irish governments to issue a statement renouncing criminality and undertaking not to infringe human rights as part of a political settlement. Its leadership issued a statement promising to end its war but it omitted any reference to crime."
