DUP now part of the mainstream ecumenical movement in Ulster

Back in October of this year, a copy of an invitation issued by the Northern Ireland Assembly Christian Fellowship, along with an introductory leaflet about the NIACF, came into my possession. The invitation was to a meeting at which the Chief Constable of the Police Service of Northern Ireland was to speak.

What was especially interesting was the fact that the Roman Catholic MLA, Alban McGuinness, was listed as one of those organising the meeting.

A reply to the invitation was to be sent to Mr Jonathan Craig, a Democratic Unionist MLA.

Email

I sent an email to Mr Craig on October 15th. I sent the same email again a short time later. I even sent a printed copy of the email to Mr Craig's constituency office in Lisburn but I received no response from either emails or the letter.

I must say that Mr Craig's silence is not surprising. It is a standard response by those hiding from the truth and wishing to avoid any highlighting of their compromise.

Below is a copy of the letter I sent to Mr Craig, a scan of the invitation to which I was referring in that email and a scan of part of the NIACF introductory leaflet.

Dear Mr Craig,

A leaflet issued by the ACF which comprised an invitation to a meeting at which the Chief Constable was to speak on 8th November and which requested a reply to you, has come to my attention.

What really intrigued me was the presence of Alban McGuinness, a Roman Catholic, amongst those who were apparently organising the meeting.

I understand, Mr Craig, that you attend a Free Presbyterian congregation. The Free Presbyterian Church does not recognise Roman Catholicism as part of the true Church of Christ. Its position was made abundantly clear in recent statements issued by the Presbytery on the occasion of the Pope's visit to the UK and also the booklet it published: 'Roman Catholicism examined by Scripture.'

Do you agree with the position of the Free Presbyterian Church or do you indeed embrace adherents of the Roman Catholic faith as true believers?

Your involvement with the AFC would suggest that you do.

Looking forward to hearing from you regarding this conundrum.


It is even more clear now that such warnings are proving to be true.
