The ruling was in June but the case came to light this month after the Bishop of Speyer, Karl-Heinz Wiesenmann, named a senior cleric involved in the abuse, Rudolf Motzenbaecker, the former vicar-general of the diocese, who died in 1998. The bishop said that three other victims had come forward independently to make accusations against the vicar and he promised a full investigation.

The man, who has not been named, was five years old when he was sent to the home run by the Order of the Sisters of the Divine Saviour in 1963. He said that he was abused on about 1, 000 occasions from 1963 to 1972.

He said that the nuns dragged him to Motzenbaecker's apartment and that he was forced to go to sex parties. "There was a room where the nuns served drinks and food to the men and in the other corner the children were raped," his court testimony said. "The nuns earned money. The men present donated generously."

He told Der Spiegel magazine: "The nuns were pimps. The children were beaten with sticks if they resisted."

Many victims, including him, had tried to commit suicide, he said, adding that he went to the police in 1970 but no one had believed him.

The Roman Catholic church in Germany has struggled to reform after revelations of widespread abuse in its institutions. An investigation commissioned by the church and published in 2018 recorded abuse involving 1, 670 clerics and 3, 677 victims, mostly boys, between 1946 and 2014. Leading clerics have been accused of covering up abuse by priests and being more interested in protecting the church than its victims.

The home in Speyer was shut in 2000. The church has paid the man, who has suffered post-traumatic stress disorder, €15, 000 in compensation plus €10, 000 to cover psychiatric counselling. He has also received a victim's pension under the ruling.
